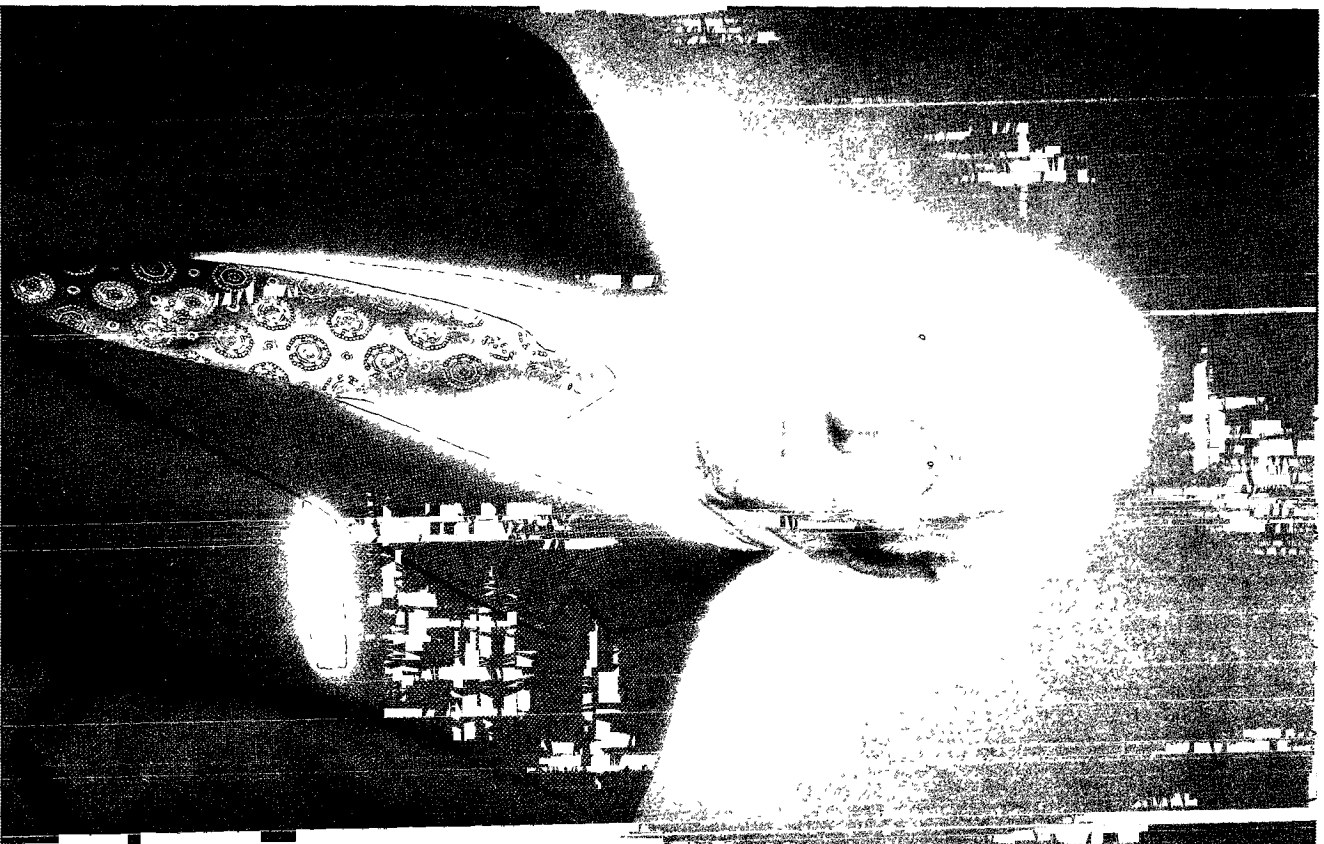

NAFE PRESIDENT JOHN P. ADAMS, JR. DIES MAY 23

John P. (Phil) Adams died suddenly on May 23, 1996. A memorial service was held for him on May 30, 1996 in San Luis Obispo, California. The National Association of Forensic Economics honored John at a special session of the Western Economics Association meeting in San Francisco on June 30, 1996. In attendance were his wife of 50 years, Flavienne; his son Sidney Michael; and family friend Marilyn Frost, who composed a moving poem honoring John's life. The WEA passed a special resolution recognizing John's involvement in the WEA and in NAFE. A copy of the resolution was framed and presented to the family by Stephen Horner. Other tributes were given by John Ward, Gerald Olson, and Luvonia Casperson. In recognition of John's service to the country, final interment was in Arlington National Cemetery on July 17, 1996.

John was an initial founder of NAFE. He served as Western Vice-President, President-Elect, and Sixth President of the Organization. His intellectual contributions to the Association were many, and he presided over extensions of NAFE into areas of a second journal, *Litigation Economics Digest*, and was instrumental in promoting the use of the Internet for NAFE data services.

At the time of his death, John was Professor Emeritus at California Polytechnic, and was recognized as an outstanding teacher. Associate Dean Walter Rice, of the School of Business at Cal Poly, stated that he had never seen students so devoted to a teacher as were John's students.

John will be greatly missed by the members of the Association. The family has requested memorial contributions be made to World Neighbors, 4127 N.W. 122nd St., Oklahoma City, Oklahoma 73120.
